


Crossword Puzzle

Third Sunday of Easter

Good morning friends! It's been a good time to do puzzles lately since we have to stay at home a lot, hasn't it? I enjoy putting puzzles together with my family, especially the really big ones...but one thing I really don't like is when we are missing a piece! Usually, we find that our cat has stolen it and hidden it in her own toys. Has this ever happened to you?

This reminds me of the Gospel story from Luke that we hear today. This story takes place on Easter. Jesus' friends are walking away from Jerusalem when they meet a stranger on the road. They start talking and they find out that the stranger has no idea about what just happened in Jerusalem. He doesn't know about Jesus, he doesn't know about Jesus or that he died and was buried so the two on the road tell the stranger all about it.

Here's the fun part of the story, the stranger was Jesus! He was walking with his friends and they didn't even know that it was him. They were so sad and worried that they couldn't see Jesus walking with them. Just like me with the puzzle piece, I get upset when a piece is missing that I don't even want to look for it, even though I probably know where it is. Jesus' friends didn't know that they were with Jesus until they sat down to eat. Jesus broke bread and poured wine, then they suddenly recognized him.

A missing puzzle piece is not really a big deal, is it? No, not really. But forgetting to look for Jesus? We do know something that those disciples didn't know, we know that Jesus is alive and among us, so we know that we should always be looking for Jesus, because he promises he'll always be with us.
